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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The case described by the authors is interesting, since the testicular pain during *Campylobacter* infection has not yet been described. It probably can be important for the early diagnosis, especially considering that the testicular pain occurred before diarrhea. This manuscript can be published, but after a minimal revision. Since the wall thickening in the ileocecal zone does not exclude lesions in the small intestine, and there are several types of *Campylobacter* infection (caused by *C. jejuni*, *C. coli*, *C. concisus*, etc.) I would recommend change the title of the article to "*Campylobacter jejuni* (gastrointestinal) infection presenting with testicular pain: A case report" or "*Campylobacter jejuni* enterocolitis presenting with testicular pain: A case report".
