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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

I read with interest the article by Di Wu and colleagues. I think that the manuscript has important value, as COVID-19 has become a critical challenge to global health. The authors formulated a workflow of emergency surgery and summarized the experience and lessons in order to provide references and suggestions for medical personnel during the pandemic period of COVID-19. I have several concerns: 1. "Abstract" needs to be rewritten and needs to be modified into a structured abstract; 2. The article lacks detailed information on case reports, such as laboratory tests, prognosis and follow-up.
