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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The manuscript, 54019, presents a rare case of Axenfeld-Rieger syndrome, affecting a 25-year old female, and its association with torsion of wandering spleen. Since upon emergent laparoscopic exploration indicated an ischemic spleen without its normal ligamentous attachment, the authors successfully performed the laparoscopic splenectomy and the patient following recovery was discharged. The described case (WS) is quite rare, and apparently associated with ARS, and thus certainly deserves publication. However, you should provide the information in the Abstract whether performed splenectomy was partial or total.
