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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The authors report an extremely rare case of an omental angiofibroma presenting as a scrotal mass. The case is described in clear and concise language, along with a comprehensive review of the literature. There is one important issue regarding the nomenclature used: while the tumor was initially diagnosed (or rather, misdiagnosed) as an epididymal mass, the final diagnosis was that of an omental tumor presenting as a inguinal/scrotal mass. Except when referring to the initial diagnosis performed in another hospital, the tumor should be addressed as a scrotal mass. I suggest modifying the title of the manuscript in accordance to this (Omental mass combined with indirect inguinal hernia led to an scrotal mass: A case report and literature review OR Omental neoplasm initially diagnosed as an epididymal mass: A case report and literature review). It would also be interesting to describe whether a surgical mesh was placed in the inguinal canal during the proceure.
