Percutaneous transhepatic biliary drainage is a safe and effective method for palliative malignant obstructive jaundice treatment. Postoperative rehabilitation is important for patients with trauma, and strengthening nursing measures improves the recovery speed. The comprehensive treatment and nursing mode implemented in the rapid rehabilitation nursing model has been well-received by most patients. This is an interesting study of percutaneous transhepatic cholangiography drainage with a rapid rehabilitation model. In this study, the authors evaluated a rapid inpatient rehabilitation model regarding rehabilitation duration and quality of life improvements after percutaneous transhepatic cholangiography drainage to improve care. A minor revision is required before manuscript acceptance. Comments: 1. A minor editing is required for the manuscript. Such as, the last sentence of the first paragraph in the "Introduction", the "maintainthe", "causesignificant", "totheir", and "causingpsychological" should be revised. The blanks between the words are missing, and it makes the words mixed up. 2. Is there any images for the surgical methods? If so, please add it.
