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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The authors submitted a very interesting case report about a young patients with twice recurrent laryngeal contact granuloma who received a combined pharmacological treatment for laryngopharyngeal reflux disease which resulted in resolution of the LCG and related symptoms. The introduction nicely summarizes the current recommendations for LCG. However, the authors do not state the aim of the study nor emphasize why they want to publish this specific case. In addition, a summary of the case report is not appropriate for the introduction. The case presentation shows, how many of those patients with atypical reflux symptoms can be a diagnostic and therapeutic challenge. Where any symptom scores or objective measurements taken to objectify LPRD? I would recommend taking the phrase "literature review" out of the title as no literature review exceeding the standard was performed. I think this case report is worth publishing as especially in difficult patients with multiple recurrences every treatment option available should be shown and discussed.
