Comments to the Authors: Please correct the spelling of the title ("acute recurrent pancreatitis"). Linguistic/stylistic problems, e.g., "a chronic pancreatic disease underlines in about one fourth of cases of recurrent acute pancreatitis" (page 2) or "Pancreatitis may develop either as a consequence of an impacted stone in the Vater's papilla that obstructs the main pancreatic duct, a very rare event occurring in no more than 5% of cases, or because a transient papillary oedema or papillary orifice relaxation following recent passage of stones, that can obstruct the pancreatic juice flow or favour duodenopancreatic reflux, respectively" (page 3). Please use the correct spelling of medical terms, e.g., trimethoprim > trimethoprim (page 10), ursodeoxycholic acid > ursodeoxycholic acid (page 13), sphincterotomy > sphincterotomy (page 13), muscularis mucosae > muscularis mucosae (page 16), en bloc resection > en bloc resection (page 16), hyaluronic acid > hyaluronic acid (page 16), toxin botulin injection > botulinum toxin injection (page 18) Typing errors, e.g., "undetected by functional tests", "should be use to predict", "has not ben done" (page 15) Illustrative figures would be appreciated.
