Albeit, the author provides insight into COVID-19 related field, I still have 1, All figures are highly professional, and the authors should guide some suggestions. the readers to the meaning of the images appropriately; otherwise, it is likely to cause misunderstandings. Therefore, I suggest that the author consider revising the figure legends again. 2, In Fig 1, the author discussed the mechanisms of pathological injury upon SARS-CoV-2 infection. It would be fascinating to discuss the correlation between cancer and coronaviruses, such as SARS, or MERS...etc. (PMID: 32416633, 32615317, 32345594, 35639708, 33918958). 3, There are few typo issues for the authors to pay attention. Please unify the writing of scientific terms. "Italic, capital"? make it consistent throughout the whole manuscript. For example, Page4, ...and 31 out of 45 post-mortem liver tissues contained the SARS-CoV-2 "RNA geome[25]". Please correct "RNA geome" as "RNA genome".
