### COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The manuscript deals with a topic with which basic researcher may not be familiar with: psychological aspects of diabetes. In this sense, the manuscript is pertinent. I dare suggest some suggestions, to gain readability: 1.- The word "theme" is used several times over the text (in the title, for instance, in the abstract) and I think "issue" would be more adequate. 2.- The abbreviation BMG is shown in the Abstract, but its meaning should be given. 3.- The first paragraph of the introduction is very similar to the abstract. Could it be somehow re-written? 3.- Hyphenation is missing in expressions like "diabetes-specific" or "self-sufficient" and some more of that sort all over the text. 4.- Figure 1 is somewhat confusing, and is not clear what it means to suggest. Why is central to diabetes? The title of the figure "Case study: interconnecting psychological themes" could apply to diabetes, or Crohn's disease or any other pathology. 5. The abbreviations of the therapies shown on the last part of the manuscript should be given in parenthesis: (CBT), (ACT), (CAT)
