Discontinuation of clopidogrel before PEG is always carried out for most gastroenterologists. The authors present their retrospective analysis to elucidate that there is no short term (<48 hours) severe adverse events for PEG without stopping that drug. However, I would be interesting in the period within one week. As you mentioned in your method, there is no related data in your result for delayed complication (>48 hours) and degree of bleeding. I also concern about when you resume the clopidogrel after the PEG. The other question is that if there any patient taking SSRI in your cases with or without bleeding?
