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## SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

This study presents the main recent topics covered by HILI and DSLI publications. Considering the large number of studies found and the limitation mentioned in the article of a global evaluation of these. I missed a study selection flowchart as well as greater transparency in the selection criteria. The study appears to aim not only at updating topic trends but also at highlighting the importance of considering and analyzing separately between HILI, DSLI and DILI. The idea of associating diverse subjects succinctly did not seem to me a good idea, but I thought it was important for the authors to explore the need for new concepts in the study of DILI due to the great dimension that herbal and food products have reached.
