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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

The manuscript covers a very contemporary and an important topic: the use of 'omic' technologies in the elucidation of the molecular genetic background of suicidal behaviour. The authors performed a literature review of genome-wide association studies, epigenetic modification studies, including DNA methylation and histone modifications, and micro-RNA, proteomic and metabolomic studies. The authors also highlight the potential of artificial intelligence, particularly machine learning, for use in research into suicidal behaviour. Indeed, this review concludes on the basis that omics represent part of the missing link between the current state of psychiatry and future personalised approaches.
