Studies have showed that the COVID - 19 outbreak is associated with increased rates of psychiatric symptoms. However, information on the long-term mental health consequences of the COVID - 19 pandemic are limited. This MS mainly reviewed the current studies, risk factors, and the possible underlying mechanisms of psychiatric sequelae in COVID-19 survivors, which could improve our understanding of mental health and the COVID-19 pandemic. However, some revisions are still needed before being published in World Journal of Psychiatry. 1. In title, "A Narrative Review "should be changed to "A narrative review". 2. In page 1, "Author contributions:" should be added. Additionally, in page 13, "CONCLUSION" should also be provided according to the journal's requirements. 3. In page 3, line 10, "...COVID-19 survivors during 14-90 days following the diagnosis"should be changed to "...COVID-19 survivors during 14-90 days were observed following the diagnosis". 4. Please refer to recent papers published in World Journal of Psychiatry and correct the format. In page 4, line 36, "Introduction" should be changed to "INTRODUCTION" In page 4, line 7, "1" should be changed to "[1]". Other citations should be modified accordingly. In page 5, line 17, "Rogers et al." should be "Rogers et al[19]" In page 6, line 9, 17, 18, and 19, "p" should be italic. In page 6, line 20, 62. 354 should be changed to 62 354? In page 9, full name (such as CNS and BBB) should be given for the first time. 5. In all references, all authors should be provided. In reference 2, "Available online at:" should be changed to "[Cited February 5, 2021?]. Available from:". In reference 3, "Transfus Apher Sci. 2020" should be changed to "Transfus Apher Sci 2020;", and volume and page numbers are 59: 102926? In reference 11, "Lugito NPHL, et al" should be changed to "Lugito NPH, Tjiang A". "Am MM, Kurniawan J Emerg Med. 2021 Mar 21;41:110-119. https://doi.org/10.1016/j.ajem.2020.12.076" should be changed to "Am J Emerg Med
