This manuscript mainly discusses the prospective cohort study of antipsychotic effectiveness, through screening and selecting suitable patient groups, followed by tracking the drugs used by patients in the treatment process, and finally reached a conclusion The idea is clear, It has significance for clinical treatment of schizophrenia, but there are still some problems: 1. Some data upload in Table 1 is incomplete, cannot know whether the data is correct. 2. The sample size of selected data is small and lasts for a long time, and the final result may be affected by sample shedding. Therefore, a larger sample size can be selected at the beginning; In addition, there was no clear explanation as to whether the patients in the selected samples were taking medication as required from the beginning to the end. 3. Further research is needed to determine whether the results hold true for all races.
