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SPECIFIC COMMENTS TO AUTHORS

I find the Editorial by Gonzalez et al very interesting and overall, nicely written. There are few comments: 1) I don't think that Latin America and Western Europe are culturally similar. Maybe, a different comparison would better fit the scope of the sentence. 2) The terms "America" and "Europe" (regarding global donation rate) are too vague. Indeed, in both continents, there are several organ donation and transplantation authorities or organization. 3) I would change "cardiac" with "circulatory" death. 4) Similarly, I would change "organ extraction" with "retrieval" or "procurement". 5) The word "harvesting" should be abandoned. Try and use "procurement" instead. 6) Xenotransplants would be excrutiatingly expensive also in countries with top level national health services, such as UK or Italy. Therefore, it would be relevant to include this topic in the discussion about costs. 7) I understand the main topic of discussion is xenotransplantation vs deceased donor transplantation. However, it would be nice mentioning living donor transplantation as well because, beside costs, it raise an ethical dilemma. Should we put healthy subjects at risk to save money?
