This retrospective and well detailed study: Dengue in renal transplant recipients: clinical course and impact on renal function, from the Kidney Transplant Unit, Universitário Walter Cantídio, Universidade Federal do Ceará, Fortaleza, Brazil, analyze the frequency and evolution of dengue infection in renal transplant patients between 2007 and 2012; updating analogous studies performed in last years in Brazil in similar patients The purpose of this analysis was to determine the clinical presentation of dengue in kidney transplant patients and its impact of the disease in patients and allograft outcomes. In conclusion the author confirmed as well as comparable analysis performed in the region, that renal transplant recipients with dengue infection have a clinical presentation and evolution similar to those seen in the general population Nevertheless, given that Brazil is the leading American country in absolute number of cases and incidence rate of the disease in this geographic area, this study is of interest as an update of the evolution of dengue in renal transplant patients in this region.
