<p>The authors report a case of lunate dislocation with triquetral fracture who recovered well after undergoing closed reduction and internal fixation. This treatment option avoids harm to the patient from open surgery. The long-term prognosis of closed reduction internal fixation procedures may require further evaluation.</p>	<p>Yes. We thank the reviewer for the insightful comments. Indeed, this was our first case to perform closed reduction internal fixation. Owing to its rarity, the long-term prognosis of this procedure was still under debate. The patient was recalled back for follow-up after post-operative 1.5 years. We did not observe obvious change of lunate necrosis or arthritis in the latest X-ray follow-up.</p>
<p>Whether lunate edema is completely resorbed or continues to progress into osteonecrosis. This needs further study.</p>	<p>Yes. We completely agree with the reviewer's comment. It was also the most important concern we wanted to know. The patient was recalled back again on Oct. 21th this year. Encouragingly, the lunate edema was almost completely resorbed, and did not progress into osteonecrosis in the follow-up MRI.</p>
