Specific Comments to Authors: This study entitled "A Systematic Review and Network Meta-Analysis of Different Non-Steroidal Anti-Inflammatory Drugs for Juvenile Idiopathic Arthritis" seems to have been generally well executed and written. Furthermore, I believe that this paper will be of great interest to the readers. Finally, in my opinion, this work is without any significant flaws, and require only minor revision before publication. Abstract Methods Misprint – ubMed Keywords Consider some additional MeSH keywords to readers easier identify your work.

Please expand a little bit a Discussion section of your paper.

Response: I have expanded a bit of Discussion about the adverse events of NSAIDs.

**Furthermore, NSAIDs are well tolerated and has a good safety record. The most common**

adverse reactions are gastrointestinal adverse effects, headache, fever rash and impairment of liver function. The most common side effects reported by patients using NSAIDs were gastrointestinal events and no SAE were documented. The study did not find a statistically significant difference in adverse events between any two drugs. The SUCRA shows that placebo ranked first (SUCRA, 88.2%), piroxicam ranked second (SUCRA, 60.5%), rofecoxib (0.6 mg/kg qd) ranked third (SUCRA, 56.1%). The rate of adverse event after administration NSAIDs varied from 0.7% to 70.5%<sup>[28-30]</sup>. Currently, there are fewer reports of changes in kidney function among children using NSAIDs, with the most common being reversible acute renal insufficiency. In the early stages of NSAID usage, other potential renal damages, such as nephrotic syndrome and interstitial nephritis, may also manifest.
