3. SCIENTIFIC QUALITY

REVIEWER 1

1.- Although the title focuses on the effect of liver on endocrine, it also suggests a bidirectional role between liver and endocrine, and the authors only present the effect of cirrhosis on endocrine, but not the effect of endocrine on liver. It is suggested that a brief description of the endocrine effects on the liver should be included in the pathophysiology section or at the appropriate place in each subsection.

The title "**From Liver to Hormones: The Endocrine Consequences of Cirrhosis**" emphasizes the impact of the liver on the endocrine system, and in fact, there is a bidirectional relationship between the liver and endocrine functions. However, it is important to note that the title itself does not explicitly convey this bidirectional aspect, which is why it may not have been addressed in the text.

2.- Figure 1 has two parts, a and b, which should be interpreted separately.

The terms "Figure 1a" and "Figure 1b" were added in the text and the figure's caption was updated to be interpreted separately.
