The author wrote that childcare agencies are not actively recruiting men. But is there any evidence to confirm it? Or, is it an estimation of the author?

This is an estimation based on the reviewed literature. It most likely varies from jurisdiction to jurisdiction.

If the latter, rather social hesitation, or discrimination, is rather responsible for sluggish spread of male adoption, in my sense.

Yes, I agree. In some jurisdictions, it is very likely due to cases of child reports of inappropriate behaviour on the part of the foster or adoptive father.

Are there any data about the acceptance rate of male candidate for foster father?

Not specifically. It very likely depends on the jurisdiction and appears to be changing over time.
